Tales of the encrypt

"Is this a secure line?" Admit itdeep in some James Bond fantasy moment, haven't you always wanted to say those words?

Well now, thanks to the Privatel encryption device (\$595), you can ask and answer.

Whether you're plotting the takeover of Freedonia or Mega-Giant Limited, you can't afford to have your rivals tap your telephone. But until recently, devices that ensured phone privacy were an exorbitantly expensive and cumbersome hassle. Not anymore. The Privatel is an eminently affordable little black box that plugs in between a telephone's handset and base. When two phones are equipped with Privatels, the conversation is so much white noise to any third party.

Privatel works with almost all cord telephones, weighs less than a pound and comes with a compact carrying case. Once it's enabled, a microprocessor employs Diffie-Hellman "public key cryptography." Your voice is encoded using a one-time-use mathematical algorithm and then decrypted by the other Privatel. You can even activate a secret PIN number.

None of this tech talk will matter much when you're plotting away in your room at the Graham Green Memorial Hotel on the Mosguito Coast. What will matter is that the device works and that the colonels' goons haven't heard a word you've said. - Nick Passmore
